# Message from the University Librarian

The 2019 annual report shows our passion at the University of Lagos Library to collect and preserve information resources and to share the resources freely with our students, staff, and researchers all over the world. Whether you are a student, a staff, a researcher, or a member of the public, there would be something in this annual report to excite you about our library.

The year saw celebration of new achievements in the University Library. First, is the appointment of the University Librarian by the University Council on the 14th of March, 2019. Our second achievement is the growth in subscriptions of electronic databases which rose from 6 to 10 with other open access resources. With this development, the library today is as much digital as it is physical. Of course, one of the wonderful things about our library is that users can move serendipitously through the shelves from books on mathematics to books on ancient Nigerian art cultures, and everything in between. The Library Management System (LMS) and Institutional Repository (IR) are great examples of how we are innovating with digital opportunities to help deliver an outstanding user experience.



During the year, we implemented the 2011 - 2014 Merged Tetfund Library Development Fund, commenced the digitization project, and introduced self-archiving options for our faculty to improve the IR digital content. The digital content in the Institutional Repository represents a key milestone towards our goal of collecting, preserving, and sharing the Institution's treasured collections with the world.

## Message from the University Librarian

Our programmes have been strengthened with 3 major events over the 12 months. One of the highlights for me was the Blind-Pick-a-Book event to mark the UNESCO World Book Day on the 23rd of April, 2019. With over 50 books blind picked two weeks prior to the day of event, students, staff, and members of the general public gathered in the library to unlock and share lessons learnt in the books read. The outcome was quite inspiring. The series of In-house training are part of events in the year to improve the skill set of our staff.

We are aware that the tens of thousands of users who walk through our doors every month rely on us to be at the center of their collaborative communities. Our reading carrels, computers, laptops are utilized to optimal capacity.

Finally, we are seeing a whole new community developing and expanding. Open education, open scholarship, open science etc, – is a critical piece of the future of research, and learning. Our library is committed to opening access to books, journals and other education resources. Library staff are also part of a dedicated workforce determined to help the University of Lagos retain its slogan of 'University of first choice and the nation's pride".

# Introduction

The University Library seeks to provide faculty, students, staff, and community users with information resources, skills and learning spaces required to succeed in their teaching, learning and research activities. We do this in a variety of ways such as providing high quality service to all library users, cultivating and maintaining a safe learning environment in which effective library service delivery is not only valued, but desired. We are continually evaluating our processes and our services to ensure that we are meeting the diverse needs of all users, including Alumni of the University of Lagos, students from other universities, and external researchers from all over the world, who rely on our library resources and services.

The library consists of three main departments and four sections. The departments are Readers' Services department, Research and Bibliographic department (Gandhi Library) and Technical Services department while the sections are Automation Section, Faculty of Education Library, Administrative Office, and Museum & Music Library. The operations and activities of the various departments and sections are coordinated by the departmental/ sectional heads under the general administration of the University Librarian.

# 1. Readers' Services Department (RSD)

The Readers' Services Department functions as the Public Relations Section of the Library where patrons meet library staff for service provision. The department coordinates activities of the service units listed.

### 1.1 Library Registration Service





Fig. 1.1 Library Registration

The library recorded nine thousand, eight hundred and ninety-nine (9,899) users' registration during the year under review. The library registration chart presents the record of library users' registration by category (see Figure 1.1).

### 1.2 Library Clearance Service

During the year 2019, the library responded to eight thousand, three hundred and sixty-one (8,361) clearance requests to ascertain users' indebtedness to the library. Clearances by category of users are as presented in Figure 1.2.



### 1.3 Reading Floors and Resource Usage

Library Resources for consultation in the main Library which are under RSD are housed in different sections, namely; 2nd floor shelving area, Boulos Engineering Library, Reserved Book Room (RBR) and Law Library.

The second floor houses all Library collections in terms of books for consultation, with reading accommodation access, except those of faculties and College of Medicine. The Boulos Engineering

### **Readers' Services Department**

Library on the same floor houses research materials in Engineering, Reserved Book Room (RBR) collection at the first floor is meant for short-term loan, while Law Library at the library basement houses all Law materials in the Library.




Fig. 1.3 Resource Usage in 2nd Floor Reading Area, Boulos and Law Library.

During the reporting period a total of twenty three thousand, six hundred and ninety-four (23,694) books were consulted at these sections; nine hundred and one (901) damaged books were retrieved; three thousand, seven hundred and three (3,703) user queries were answered; two thousand and eighty-seven (2,087) newly processed books were added to the library collection; while two hundred and fifty (250) photocopy requests were made. Services offered during the year at these sections are presented in Figure 1.3.

#### 1.4 Book Loan




Fig. 1.4 Circulation and RBR loans

Circulating books are loanable at the Circulation desk for specific loan periods; laptops and other subject texts are equally loanable at the circulation desk and Reserved Book Room (RBR) respectively for short loan duration. Figure 1.4 presents the record of loan requests received at the circulation and Reserved Book Room sections of the Readers' Services department during the year under review. At the circulation desk, record indicated ten thousand, one hundred and thirty-three (10,133) books checked out; eight thousand, nine hundred and seventy-two (8,972) books checked in; two thousand, two hundred and sixty-two (2,262) books renewed; eight hundred and thirty-six (836) overdue books and one hundred and fourteen (114) laptops checked out; and same number checked in. Three thousand, two hundred and forty-seven (3,247) books were checked out at the Reserved Book Room with a corresponding value checked in.

#### 1.5 Users' Head Count




Fig. 1.5 Users' Head count at Main Library




Fig. 1.6 Users' Head count at Faculty and other libraries

Record of daily head count taken in various library locations indicate that a total of two hundred and seventy-two thousand, and twenty-seven (272,027), and one hundred and twenty-six thousand, one hundred and eight (126,108) library users were recorded at the main and faculty libraries respectively. Details of records taken are presented in Figures 1.5 and 1.6.

### 1.6 Visually Impaired Resource Centre (VIRC)




Fig. 1.7 Resource usage at VIRC

The Visually Impaired Resource Centre caters for the information needs of students with visual impairment. This unit of the library is located at the library basement. Activities in the section includes document conversion to braille and document scanning. Eleven (11) documents were converted to braille during the period, while twenty-five (25) documents were scanned for use by students as shown in Figure 1.7.

### 1.7 24-Hour Library Service




Fig. 1.8 24-Hour Library Service Users' Head Count

This service is provided between the hours of 10pm and 6am at the Akintunde-Ojo Library Extension during examination periods only. For the year 2019, the service took place from May to July (First semester examinations) and October to December (Second semester examinations) for undergraduate, postgraduate and Distance Learning Institute students of the University. Usage statistics of students for the year 2019 was eighty thousand, two hundred and forty-eight (80,248) as presented in Figure 1.8.




Fig. 1.9 Record of activities at Faculty of Education Library

# 2. Research and Bibliographic Department (Gandhi Library)

The Research and Bibliographic Department also known as the Gandhi Library houses resources on Africa, Nigeria, Special collections (i.e. private collections of scholars bequeathed to the university library), Newspapers, Government papers and Gazettes. The Gandhi library primarily caters for the research needs of its target patrons (mainly members of faculty, postgraduate students and external users/researchers).

#### 2.1 Resources Received




Fig. 2.1: Print Resources Received

Resources received during the year include four hundred and forty-four (444) Books, twenty (20) Conference papers, one hundred and seven (107) Business Day newspapers (gift), three hundred and fifty-five (355) Government documents, eighteen (18) Inaugural lectures and five hundred and sixteen (516) Theses. Figure 2.1 presents record of activities in the department for the period under review.

### 2.2 Resource Usage




Fig. 2.2 Print Resources Consulted

Resources consulted in the department during the period include three hundred and fifty-five (355) Books, nine (9) Conference papers, three hundred and eighty-nine (389) Newspapers, five (5) Government documents, twenty (20) Inaugural lectures, five hundred and nine (509) Theses, three (3) periodicals, seventy-seven (77) Convocation proceedings, two (2) Reference materials, and one hundred and three (103) Special collections as presented in Figure 2.2

The Technical Services department coordinates the management processes of library resources from selection, acquisition until it gets to the shelf. The department comprises the following sections: Acquisitions, Cataloguing, Serials, Gifts and Exchange and Bindery. Activities at the various sections of the department are as presented.

### 3.1 Acquisitions Section




Fig. 3.1 Acquisitions procedure

The section is responsible for selection, ordering and receiving resources for the library. Acquisitions procedure for the year include: selection of one thousand, one hundred and ninety-one (1,191) titles for ordering; acquisition of one thousand, four hundred and ninety-nine (1,499) books by purchase; and acquisition of one thousand, six hundred and eighty-seven (1,687) books by donation. Three thousand, eight hundred and forty-six (3,846) books were received and stamped; three thousand, two hundred and seventy-three (3,273) books were accessioned; bibliographic details of one thousand, nine hundred and twenty-four (1,924) books were entered on cards; while one thousand, two hundred and seventy-two (1272) books were audited. A total of three thousand, four hundred and forty-nine (3,449) processed books were moved to Cataloguing section for further processing. Record of activities at the Acquisitions section for the year 2019 is presented in Figure 3.1.

### 3.2 Cataloguing Section




Fig. 3.2: Cataloguing Procedure

This section of the Technical Services Department takes charge of cataloguing and classification of library books and ensures that books on the same and related subject areas are arranged and kept together on shelves. During the year under review, the section received two thousand, one hundred and seventy-nine (2,179) books. Books catalogued and classified were four thousand, six hundred and seventeen (4,617); while three hundred (300) PhD Theses were processed, i.e. catalogued and classified. Figure 3.2 presents the record of activities.

#### 3.21 Book Distribution




Fig. 3.3: Book distribution within the library

The Cataloguing section coordinates the distribution of processed materials to the various library locations. Figure 3.3 shows the distribution of books within the library. Sixty-seven (67) books were sent to Boulos Engineering library; one thousand, one hundred and ninety-four (1,194) to RBR; Gandhi library received a total of five hundred and eighty-six (586) books and thesis; one hundred and ninety-five (195) books were sent to Law library; and one thousand, eight hundred and forty-six (1,846) books were sent to Second floor reading section.




Fig. 3.4: Book distribution to faculty and other libraries

Distribution of processed books to faculty and other libraries is as follows: Faculty of Social Science, thirty-nine (39) books; Science, Sixteen (16); Pharmacy, thirty-one (31); Management Science, sixty-one (61); Environmental Science, twelve (12); Engineering, four (4); Education, two hundred and ninety-one (291); Arts, fifty-nine (59); and J.P.Clark library, fifty-one (51). The distribution is presented in Figure 3.4.

#### 3.3 Serials Section




Fig. 3.5: Journal distribution in the library and other faculty libraries

The Serials section is located on the third floor of the library and houses all journals/periodicals subscribed to by the Library. Users are required to make request and collect materials they need from staff in charge as the collection is closed access. Details of how processed journals/periodicals are distributed in the library and faculty libraries during the period are here presented. A total of four hundred and ninety-eight (498) journals/periodical titles were received during the reporting year, while the breakdown of processed journal titles distributed within the library and to faculty libraries as shown in Figure 3.5 are: Third floor, one hundred and ninety-four (194); Faculty of Arts, fifteen (15); Education, fifty-nine (59); Engineering, sixty-seven (67); Social Science, twenty-five (25); Management Science, fifty-six (56); Environmental Science, five (5); Law Library, fourteen (14); and MBA Library, two (2).

#### 3.4 Gifts & Exchange




Fig. 3.6: Gifts and Exchange record

The unit was established to further enhance the library collections through gifts and exchange. Books, journals and non-print resources received in the unit during the period include eight hundred and forty-five (845) books; nine hundred and fifty-four (954) Journals being gifts, while seventy-one (71) books and one thousand and twenty-eight (1,028) journals and one (1) Compact Disk (CD) were received from Exchange partners. Figure 3.6 present the record.

#### 3.5 Bindery Section




Fig. 3.7: Bindery Services

The Bindery section provides ancillary services for the library. It handles general book binding for the university library, students, researchers, departments, and the university community. For the university library, the section repaired four hundred and twenty-six (426) books/journals, bound one hundred and fifty-two (152) volumes of newspapers; produced five hundred and seventy-six (576) Cloakroom tags and two (2) display cards; and spiral bound two hundred and eighteen (218) documents. The section also carried out commercial services to other customers within and around the university community. A total number of one hundred and seventeen (117) books and other materials were repaired for this category of clientele. Figure 3.7 presents the record of services rendered during the year under review.

# 4. Automation Section

The Automation section was established to promote e-learning in the university. The University Library services are usually leveraged on internet driven services which has increased the use of electronic resources over the years. The University by practice still subscribes to scholarly rich databases which include:

- EBSCOHOST (i.e. Academic Source Complete, Business Source complete)
- Science Direct
- Scopus

Users can access these resources through the library website https://library.unilag.edu.ng/, the E-Library, the university internet environment and remote login. During the reporting year, subscription to some of the databases was renewed.

#### 4.1 Electronic Database Usage




Fig. 4.1: E-Database usage

During the year 2019, the library engaged in periodic information literacy programmes for students and staff in the use of electronic databases. The awareness resulted in increased usage statistics of these resources. The e-database usage chart (Figure 4.1) presents a summary of three of the databases.

#### 4.2 Institutional Repository (IR)

During the year 2019, the library introduced self-archiving method of populating the Institutional Repository and trained academic staff on the procedure involved. The project allowed for increased university research to be searchable and visible for improved webometric ranking. A total of nineteen (19) communities/faculties have been populated with five thousand, nine hundred and twenty-two (5,922) content as represented in the chart.




Fig. 4.2: Institutional Repository data



#### 4.3 Library Management System (LMS)

During the reporting year, the university library deployed a new library management software called New Generation Library Management Software (NEWGENLIB) to automate library processes - acquisitions, cataloguing, circulation and serials modules. The library has since commenced the content upload of its collection and retrospective conversion of its collection following the deployment and installation of the new library software. # 5. Finance

#### 5.1 Cash Generated at the University Library

During the year 2019, the library generated a total sum of two million, six hundred and eighty-nine thousand, fifty-seven naira (N2,689,057.00). Of the total sum, two million, six hundred thousand, two hundred and fifty-seven naira (N2,600,257.00) was generated from a range of services at the Circulation Unit, while eighty-eight thousand, eight hundred naira (N88,800.00) was generated at the Bindery Section for services rendered to members of the university community. 


Fig. 5.1: Cash generated at the University Library
